The year 2020 was yet another action-packed year for CCAYEF. Outstanding achievements for the above strategies are documented in this wonderful report together with testimonies, best practices, success stories, and future plans. 



Education Model, All Stakeholders' Schools in Charge (SiC) Model, and the Principal Rights based Model with numerous evidence-based outcomes.



Is CCAYEF work aligned with the SDGs, what is the Contribution!

According to our 2019 -2023 Strategic Plan, CCAYEF’s work currently rotates around, and contributes towards achievement of four of the seventeen Sustainable Development Goals; 3, 4, 5, 6, and will in future also fully contribute to SDG 9. This report will therefore focus on presenting achievements with CCAYEF priority areas and future plans for the year 2021.

We fully offer support to Orphans and other Vulnerable Children

SDG 3 Ensure healthy lives and promotes well-being for all at all ages;

In a bid to contribute to SDG 3, CCAYEF under her strategic priority One - Child Protection, set out to have her activities focus on the health of children and adolescents, their nutrition and access to civil registration services and creating safe spaces for children in school and in the community. We are also engaged with prevention of Teenage pregnancy, early marriages and unintended second pregnancies for young women and teenage mothers 10-24 years. We fully offer support to Orphans and other Vulnerable Children and prevention of vulnerability through promotion of retention and completion of schooling and access to sanitary materials and menstrual hygiene management facilities and strengthening social capital for adolescent girls in school.

This is done through; Conducting risk reduction sessions for pregnant girls and child mothers; Promotion of safe motherhood among child mothers and child survival; Training OVCs and their Households in VSLA methodology and engaging them in purposive saving; promoting food security and improve nutrition intake through educating OVCs and care-takers on Backyard farming methodology. For example in the year under review, the OVC program reached 381 households were 1076 children were served with different services.

Over the years

Fig. 3: Service Provision Disaggregation among the OVC




Fig: 3 above evidently shows that all the children served received the counseling services, 697 children received Nutrition support and 302 received Agricultural Advisory services through the Backyard Scheme.

Fig. 4: Age Segregated Representation of Service Provision to OVC




Fig. 4: above shows that more female OVC were reached with services than male, age group 5-9 years is more vulnerable followed by 10-14 (pre-adolescents).

CCAYEF contributes to SDG 3, activity 3.3 which emphasizes ending of the **epidemics** of AIDS, tuberculosis, malaria and neglected tropical diseases and combat hepatitis, water-borne diseases and other communicable diseases.

This is done through mobilizing communities to increase uptake of integrated health promotion and prevention services focusing on VMMC where 75 men were referred to Mukono Church of Uganda and Mukono Hospital for Voluntary Male Medical Circumcision and 57 received this service; Carrying out integrated and optimized HIV testing where 95 uniformed men (PP) tested for HIV and 159 clients were reached through index testing. In the same vein, to boost the nutritional intake of HIV Positive children, 17 caretakers from (HIV infected and affected households) were trained in food preparation (Ekitoobero) demonstration from Mukono General Hospital and Mukono Church of Uganda Hospital reaching 68 OVC.




Food preparation demonstration at General Hospital


Fig. 4: Number of AGYW reached with HIV/AIDS Services

On the side of Adolescent Girls and Young Women, they received HIV/AIDS prevention information, HIV counseling, screening and testing services during the year under review where 491 girls were served in the different safe spaces of CCAYEF as shown in Fig. 4 below – desegregated by age group.

Majority of the AGYW served were between 20-24 years, followed by 15-19 and lastly, 10-14.

Among the 491 girls, Fig. 5 above indicates that 26 girls received the parenting skills together with their caretakers; 66 girls received a family planning package and 15 girls received post Violence care. All girls received sessions of Risk Reduction, HIV Screening and testing, counseling, STI screening and Social Economic Strengthening package which includes Financial literacy, VSLA and Vocational Skilling. All these activities are intended to keep the HIV negative girls negative and the link the HIV positive ones to care.

Success Story


Shamim (**Pseudo**) aged 24 from Kitete village one of the beneficiaries has this to say;

When I joined CCAYEF, I was taken through the Risk Reduction sessions, acquired skills in Tailoring and Fashion Designing but also joined a Village Saving and Loans Association group (VSLA) and started saving money. I was earning from the sewing business with the goal of acquiring my own tailoring machine. “Before joining the program, I had no hope of acquiring my own sewing machine and how life would be in future”. Thanks to CCAYEF, I currently own a sewing machine of my own which i purchased using my savings from the VSLA group.



A part from caring for the AGYW HIV prevention programs, CCAYEF also takes care of HIV positive and negative OVC right from pre-natal, post-natal, through the EID processes with their mothers in partnership with the available Health Facilities. Fig 6 below gives the details of the outcomes.

From the above graph, it is evident that the largest number of children served was in the age group of 5-9 and the least number in the less than one-year age group.

When it comes to section 3.7 of SDG 3;

Ensure **Universal** access to sexual and reproductive health-care services, including for family planning, information and education, and the integration of reproductive health into national strategies and programs;

CCAYEF takes trouble to work towards contributing to this section done through provision SRHR Services, Risk Reduction and Empowerment Classes for girls and boys in and out of school.

CCAYEF also creates pathways to health services access for young people in order to eliminate Health service gaps that hinder uptake of health services. We training community volunteers (VHTs) and peer mentors on ASRH who in turn support referral pathways for Vulnerable, sick and abused young people to services.

Table 1 above shows the SRH Risk Reduction Services offered to in and out of school girls by age Group. All the girls were screened for HTS (2815 girls). Under the 10-14 age-groups, 1 girl received a family planning service, 9 received Prep, 36 received condoms and none got post violence care. Under the 15-19 Age Group, most girls received condoms, 187 received a family planning service, 41 received Prep and 21 received Post Violence Care. Under the 20-24 Age Group, 1436 girls received condoms, 258 received family planning services, 28 received Prep and 22 received Post Violence Care. 36 girls also received Risk Reduction Classes in the 10-14 age group, 1321 girls in the 15-19 age group and 1448 girls in the 20-24 age group.

We promote self-reliance among the youth through skills development aiming at equipping youth and young people with functional skills and income generating activities delivered through vocational training, small scale open field agriculture, facilitating employment opportunities and supporting Village Saving and Loan Association/Scheme (VSLA) activities, and Financial Literacy. This component works to provide knowledge and skills necessary for economic productivity and self-reliance.

The youth are also engaged in Village Savings and Loans Associations with 20 to 30 members per group intended to nurture their saving culture and take small loans from those savings to start up Income Generating Activities (IGAs). A total of 32 groups (491 youth) were trained in VSLA methodology. These groups are self-managed and through their constitution. When groups save for at least 6 months, they are taken through Financial Literacy packages including book keeping. 12 groups (185 Youth) received Financial Literacy sessions to enable them manage their businesses well. CCAYEF promotes youth employability and entrepreneurship skills for self-sustenance, hence, contributing to SDG 4.4

CCAYEF contributes to SDG 4:

Ensuring inclusive and equitable quality education and promote lifelong learning opportunities for all through her Strategic Priority 3 (Socio-Economic Strengthening and Skilling for the Youth)

This aims at substantially increasing the number of youth and adults who have relevant skills, including technical and vocational skills, for employment, decent jobs and entrepreneurship.

CCAYEF engages youth in Vocational skills training in courses like; Tailoring and Fashion Designing, Hair dressing and Salon, Jewelry and crafts making and liquid soap making, Flower Arrangement and Decoration. A total of 2805 youth benefited from this program in 2020. They received vocational skills and shall be graduating later this year (2021) immediately after the lockdown. They will later sit for their DIT Exams to get government certificates.



SDG 5. Achieve gender equality and empower all women and girls:

CCAYEF contributes to section 5.2 of SDG 5; Eliminating all forms of violence against all women and girls in the public and private spheres, including

trafficking and sexual and other types of exploitation through enhancing life skills and knowledge for self-reliance and sustainable development; Supporting referral path ways for GBV Survivors; and Facilitating school based career guidance and life skills training and SRHR for the girls and boys. These Strategies enable them to have high self-esteem to avoid risky places/situations and also report Gender Based Violence cases or concerns they face in their homes, community and school. 18 GBV cases were handled in 2020, 5 girls received one on one counseling sessions and 13 cases were followed up to the end while 360 girls were sensitized on GBV.

CCAYEF in the year 2020 contributed towards achieving SDG 6;Ensuring availability and sustainable management of water and sanitation for all through activities that are mainly targeting Section6.2 aimed at achieving access to adequate and equitable sanitation and hygiene for all and end open defecation, paying special attention to the needs of women and girls and

those in vulnerable situations. CCAYEF promotes and implements WASH activities in schools and communities by use of the Market Based Sanitation Implementation Approach (MBSIA) and WASH in Schools (WiS) Approach. MBSIA & WiS is a community driven project aimed at mobilizing and triggering communities/ villages to increase household access to sanitation and water services, and adoption of key hygiene behaviors at home, school, and health facilities. And facilitating schools to become WASH friendly. This project is funded by USAID/ Uganda Sanitation for Health Activity to be implemented in Kangulumira, Busaana, Kitimbwa Sub counties in Kayunga District; and Buikwe, and Ngogwe Sub counties in Buikwe district.

By June 2020, all 4 target schools had become WASH friendly with dedicated teachers in charge of WASH at each school who is responsible for regular operation and maintenance of facilities, adequate menstrual hygiene management (MHM) facilities

for girls, School Health Clubs (SHC) appropriately linked to the community; Institutionalized WASH behaviors in schools; latrine breaks for each class were set, functional, gender segregated latrine for boys and girls adequate stances, basic access to drinking water from an improved water source, hand washing facilities with water and soap available for all the learners to access.

In turn, parents responded by enhancing their commitment to support their children's neatness and hygiene by providing to them with toilet papers to use at school, uniforms, and school shoes in all the four schools; Kangulumira C/U, Kimooli UMEA, Kangulumira R/C, and Kamuli UMEA

“The percentage of pupils wearing shoes and school uniforms at school has increased from 30% (229) to 75% (575) since the start of the Project.”

Success Story

Success story from senior woman teacher - Kimooli UMEA PS

Before the implementation of the WASH program in Kimooli UMEA primary school the Health Club was dormant and non-functional though being in place. It did not have the leaders and members, stipulated activities and priorities. Activities like poems, drama/skits, songs were not used by club members to pass on messages to fellow pupils since they didn't have clear message to put across. However, since the commencement of the project, the school has gone ahead to make poems, skits/dramas, songs which are presented on health parades. And all pupils are well sensitized about WASH and are fond of singing the Sanitation Anthem.

While implementing the same activities, CCAYEF advocated on behalf of the schools for Gender friendly menstrual hygiene management facilities and structures in all target schools and the outcome was positive. Three schools including Kimooli UMEA, Kamuli UMEA and Kangulumira CU received separate latrines for girls, incinerator, 1000Litre Tanks and group handwashing facilities in November 2020 from Rotary Club Uganda.



Meanwhile, through the Market Based Sanitation Implementation Approach (MBSIA), CCAYEF was triggering communities/ villages to increase household access to sanitation and water services, and adoption of key hygiene behaviors at home. We are proud to report that a total number of 1132 HHs were enumerated in six parishes of Kangulumira SC as having moved from both Open Defecation (OD) and unimproved sanitation to constructing a latrine or moving to improved sanitation.

SDG 9; Building resilient infrastructure to promote inclusive and sustainable industrialization and foster innovation

CCAYEF under her Strategic Priority (Research, Creativity and Innovation) contributes to SDG 9 section 9.5;

Enhancing scientific research, upgrade the technological capabilities of industrial sectors in all countries, in particular developing countries, including, encouraging innovation and substantially increasing the number of research and development workers per 1 million people and public and private research and development spending.

CCAYEF only implements evidence based strategies that can meet society needs. CCAYEF employs pre and post-testing of what works and what doesn't;

carries out Baseline and End line Surveys, to guide planning, implementation, Monitoring, Learning and Evaluations for her interventions. In 2020 for example, CCAYEF carried out one Baseline and one end line studies on WASH status in Kangulumira Sub county – Kayunga district. The results of the baseline are shared here:

Outcomes of the baseline survey

CCAYEF conducted a Health baseline survey in Kangulumira Sub County in 41 villages of 6 parishes including Kangulumira parish, Kawoomya, Kigayaza, Kikwanya, Nakatundu and SeetaNyiize. In these parishes, 9418 Households were enumerated and the main purpose was to find out the status of latrine and Hand Washing coverage among Households (HHs) in the selected parishes and villages and other indicators. The findings were as follows:

As shown in Table 2 above, out of the 9418 Households enumerated, 4406 HHs had Improved Latrines, 1452 had No latrine and 3560 HHs had Unimproved Latrines. SeetaNyiize Parish had the highest number of people with No latrines (399) and Kikwanya parish with the lowest (70). Generally, most of the HHs Had improved Latrines (46%) compared to the HHs that had Unimproved latrines and No latrines.

The Table 3 above shows that of the 9,418 HHs 9212 of the Households had No Hand Washing Facilities, 173 had limited hand washing stations and only 33 HHs had Basic Hand Washing facilities. This implies that by far most Households did not have Hand Washing Facilities (98%) with Seeta Nyiize Parish having the highest number of People with No Hand Washing Stations (2388).

CCAYEF plans to contribute further on SDG 9 by expanding efforts towards innovative interventions, research, and documentation to support youth ideas while making them become realities.

CCAYEF strives to make its self-strong and organized through her Strategic Priority 4;Organizational Strengthening And Capacity Building.

She does this through strengthen organizational capacity and competences in governance, programming and execution of its mandate; Formulation of strategic Partnerships with Donor communities, Academic Institutions and Clubs; To operationalize all the Organizations structures; and Re-tool itself.

In the year under review, westrengthen local, National and International partnerships and networks withUganda Sanitation for Health Activity (USHA) and MUWRP in implementation of MBSIA &WiSand HIV prevention projects respectively. CCAYEF subscribes to networks like KANGO, GMNASO, MUDINFO, UNGOF, UYONET, UWASNET and GNB Global and National Networks

CCAYEF shared her work plans, reports and policy documents to and with all stakeholders and participated in local Government Budget conferences and municipality and district levels.

➤ Since 2020, CCAYEF has acquired and operationalized field offices in Busaana, Kitimbwa, Ngogwe and Buikwe Sub Counties. And for that reason, acquired 8 laptops to ease implementation, communication, and documentation. On top of that, we acquired 4 tables and 3 office cabins for field offices, two tables and office cabins. CCAYEF is so grateful for having received 6 motorcycles from USHA to facilitate smooth implementation of the MBSIA and WiS Project.

- In a bid to operationalize all the organizational structures, CCAYEF recruited 6 more staff in addition to the already existing staff and volunteers. All staff were oriented and settled in so well having agreed to work towards achieving the CCAYEF mission, vision, and objectives and tools to acquaint themselves with the organization as seen in the photos below:




- CCAYEF staffs have also attended several other capacities building workshops and conferences and also in turn built the capacity of teachers, parents, community leaders, mobilizers and mentors in different schools of fields of our work.
- CCAYEF, in regard of the great work that her staff has done in 2020, she procured a staff van that facilitates her Staff in transport and transportation of training materials. The CCAYEF board provided staff with food aid during the March to June, 2020 lockdown, and procured a second water tank at head office to ease water shortages. The CCAYEF Board reviewed and amended the HR and Financial policies of the organization.

Key achievements, challenges and lessons learnt

General achievements

- We held our 3rd graduation ceremony where 150 completed their vocational courses and they were awarded certificates by the Deputy Mayor for Mukono Municipality.
- CCAYEF's contract with USHA was renewed by USHA/USAID to implement the MBSIA and WiS for Phase II in 5 sub counties after meeting all our Phase I contractual obligations.

Challenges

- The outbreak of COVID 19 that brought a stand still on the rate at which the organization was doing its work.
- Inadequate funds to implement some of the unfunded organizational activities.

General lessons learnt:

- Creation of good relationship with all the stakeholders makes them to own the programs thus registering success.
- VSLA groups instills saving culture in the AGYW and OVC caretakers as it enables them to save for the future thus improving on their wellbeing.
- Triggering during baseline data collection contributes a lot to the faster pace of having results on ground.
- Educational tours tend to help girls get exposed to other skills related to their skills.

General recommendations

There is need to introduce outdoor games for girls like sports and drama.

Organisational plans for next year

- Re-locating the Research, Creativity, and Innovation Department such that it becomes a fully-fledged section.
- Introduction of in-door games for AGYW
- Draw a fundraising Strategy
- Carry out GBV prevention campaigns



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
